

# Religious festivals: In favour of the environment, or not?



Diwali, also known as Deepavali, is the Hindu festival of light and sound. It is also a major time for friends and families to get together, exchange gifts, and eat lots of traditional sweets and savouries. Sadly, this festival is known to cause severe air and soil pollution.

We started bursting crackers during Diwali only after gunpowder was first imported from China. In the past, when Diwali was first celebrated, lamps were used to light the houses. The festival was celebrated after monsoon, at the time when insects like mosquitoes, and bugs were very common. The smoke from lamps was used to drive away these insects. Soon after the invention of gunpowder became known to Indians, Diwali was celebrated as a mix of the two original principles: smoke and light. Therefore, the bursting of crackers became the main part of the festival.

On the day of Diwali in the year 2019, Delhi, one of the most polluted cities in India, had almost 10 times more than the 'average' amount of pollution known globally.

Diwali is also known to cause soil pollution. The chemicals present in the crackers mix with the soil, changing it chemically. Plants, trees, and small animals that live underground have been affected badly. Plant and trees also take in the chemicals present in the soil. This may cause deficiencies, and perhaps, eventually, death. Animals may eat these infected plants and fall ill. Because there is not much rain at this time, the pollutants cannot get washed away.

Another well-known festival to cause soil pollution is Holi. The aim of the festival is to get the city colourful. This is fulfilled by people of all ages as they throw colours on each other. When the chemicals in the colours combine with the soil, it can be fatal to all forms of life.

Holi also leads to water pollution. The chemicals mix in the water bodies closest to the area of celebration. The chemicals are then taken in by all organisms, in different ways. Fish, and other water dwelling creatures that live in the polluted water and can get infected. Other life forms may drink the water directly or eat a creature that is infected by it.

Festivals are a joyous time for celebrations. They provide happiness, fun, and an opportunity to get together with family and friends. But how ecofriendly are they?



Water pollution is also caused by the festivities of Ganesh Chaturthi. This festival marks the birth of Lord Ganesha and lasts from 1 to 11 days, depending on the place.

The dissolution of clay idols in water on the last day is one of the main rituals in this festival. I the past, the idols used to be made up of only clay, but recently, the idols have been painted to look more attractive. This paint poses a huge problem. The clay idols were easily dissoluble and didn't change the water chemically. The paint on the idols, however, is not dissoluble and could change the water chemically, creating lots of health problems for many living organisms.

These are only a few problems caused by religious festivals. However, these are also the kind of problems that we can solve by ourselves, if only all of us are willing to work towards the protection of the environment.



As PM Narendra Modi says about Swatch Bharat, "India can do it. People of India can do it."







# What does the Citizenship Amendment Act mean for India?

The CAA has created quite a big impact on the country ever since it was launched by Amit Shah, Minister of Home Affairs.



Ever since CAB (Citizenship Amendment Bill) became a law, it has created quite a stir. Protests are growing day by day, petitions are being signed, reports of violence are increasing, and as days go by, social media is flooding with more news and rumors about every action regarding the CAA. It is not only the citizens who have opinions on this as many Ministers are also sharing their views out loud. And this is just the beginning.

# What does the Citizenship Amendment Act mean for India?

The CAA makes it easier for Non-Muslim immigrants from Pakistan, Bangladesh & Afghanistan to get an Indian citizenship. To get a citizenship you must either be born in India or must have lived in India for 11 years; however, for people who were forced to seek shelter in India, they can get the citizenship five years earlier through this act. Although the law doesn't state clearly, this applies to Hindus, Sikhs, Buddhists, Parsis, Jains, and Christians facing ill-treatment in any of the three countries mentioned earlier to request an Indian citizenship, evidently excluding Muslims.

The CAB had passed the Lok Sabha after a sevenhour-long debate. It had passed with 334-106 votes. The bill then passed the Rajya Sabha with 125-105 votes, making it an official law.

NRC (National Register of Citizens) was first implemented in Assam where it targeted illegal migrants. A person has to prove that either they or their ancestors were in Assam on or before March 24, 1971. It was only maintained for the state of Assam until recently Minister Amit Shah declared during a parliamentary session that the register would be extended for the whole country. After the final updated NRC was released, it excluded the names of over 19 lakh applicants, including Hindus. Now, the CAA will guarantee that they are not harmed. But unlike CAA, NRC was not based on religion.

Among all the states in Northeast, the most outrage against both CAA and NRC has been from Assam. Since CAA affects a large part of Assam, the protests come from the fear of change in cultural and linguistic identities and demography.


However, that's not the only reason for the protests. The CAA clearly alienates Muslims as their religions has not been included for attaining citizenship as per this law. Students from many universities such as Jamia Millia Islamia and Delhi University have been protesting severely amid the heavy police arrangement.

While speaking at an Economic Times event, Amit Shah had challenged those who are opposing the law. He said, "Can the Congress say that all the Muslims from Pakistan, Afghanistan and Bangladesh should be given citizenship here? Let Sonia Gandhi make such a statement tomorrow and see... I have a challenge for all those opposing the law—Tell the people of the country openly that we would welcome all the Muslims from Pakistan, Afghanistan and Bangladesh to India. Let them say this! And if they can't say so, they should stop opposing the law."





What is happening in the protests?

The protests started off peacefully and harmless. Until recently, not many reports and news of violence were mentioned. The most recent news talks about the violence getting out of hand in Mangalore. There was said to be a mob of 7,000 people who attacked the police, hence forcing them to open fire. The news did not stop there, as there were reports of two people losing their lives because of all the violence. It was confirmed that one of them was shot.

However, Assam has a different story. Film stars, celebrities, students, and common people cutting across religions assembled in thousands to protest against CAA & NRC. Among the thousands of protesters were a group of students sitting in the front. Some of them were only 14 and 15.

"Internet ban has not stopped us from coming the theore. We expect around 2000 students from schools to come here. If the internet was working, the numbers would be much more," said Sandeep Singh, a 14-year-old class 9 student, according to find a solution. India Today.

When the AAIS community (the TSS campus) was asked on their perspectives on transgender, each one had a different response.

Alex Fierro, a transgender and gender fluid fictional character from Magnus Chase, was kicked out of her house when she was just a 10-year-old. Alex was born male but usually identifies as female. But sometimes Alex prefers the pronouns 'he' and 'him'. Yet, she was kicked out and shunned by her own family. Alex's only solace was a pottery club. She lived and survived on the streets until she died and attained Valhalla.

Although Fierro's story is fictional, real-life for trans-people is a thousand times worse. "Many of them have no jobs, even if they are completely literate and are eligible for the job," comments Meena, a Grade 9 student from AAIS, West Mambalam. Some of them turn to jobs no one wants. "It's like playing hide-and-seek from the society because they are not accepted," said Diana, a teacher in the same school.

In India many trans-women go out blessing people on the streets. It is because in the Hindu mythology it is believed that Lord Shiva has an avatar that is a fusion of Lord Shiva and his wife, the goddess Parvathy. It is considered good luck to be blessed by trans-women as they are considered to be the manifestation of Lord Shiva's Ardhanarishvara form. Yet the trans-women do this only for the money, as they are not given any proper jobs.

After years of battling with the society for their identities, transgenders are slowly being accepted. But we still have a long way to go. Hey, something is better than nothing! Bangtan Sonyeondan (BTS) is a Korean-pop band that has 7 members. It was created through auditions by Big Hit Entertainment in 2010. They staged their first performance in 2013. Big Hit Entertainment was a company that didn't have much support; although they were able to support BTS, they lacked the power to popularise the band in the music industry.

Since Big Hit Entertainment was not famous, BTS had to release all their songs through the Youtube channel '1thek,' a channel that supports new bands. During the time when BTS did their first concert, they had very few fans, like 300-350.

In the year 2019, Big Hit Entertainment's own Youtube channel become popular. It now has 30.6 million subscribers. 





World Cups are organized by the International Cricket Council. Let's start our journey, learning about them...

# 1. 1975- First World Cup at England

England and New Zealand qualified for the semifinals from Group A. West Indies and Australia qualified for the semifinals from Group B.

New Zealand lost to West Indies by 5 wickets. England lost to Australia by 4 wickets. Then, West Indies won by 17 runs in the grand finals.

# 2. 1979- Second World Cup at England

England and Pakistan qualified for the semifinals from Group A. West Indies and New Zealand qualified for semifinals from Group B.

England won in the first semifinal against New Zealand by 9 runs. West Indies won its semifinal against Pakistan by 43 runs. West Indies won its 2nd World Cup in a row by defeating England by 92 runs.

# 3. 1983- Third World Cup at England

Again, England and Pakistan qualified for semifinals from Group A. From Group B India and West Indies qualified.

India and West Indies went to the finals. India won in the final by downing the mighty West Indies by 43 runs and became World Champions.

## 4. 1987- Fourth World Cup at India and Pakistan

India and Australia qualified from Group A. England and Pakistan qualified from Group B for semifinals.

In the semis, Australia won by 18 runs against Pakistan. There was another India-England encounter in which India lost by 35 runs. In the finals, Australia won its 1st title after defeating England by 7 runs.

# 5. 1992- Fifth World Cup at New Zealand and Australia

New Zealand lost to Pakistan by 4 wickets in the semi-final, and England beat South Africa by 19 runs.

In the finals, Pakistan beat England by 22 runs to become World Champions. This is England's 3rd defeat in the finals.

# 6. 1996- Sixth World Cup at India and Pakistan

In this world cup tournament, quarter-finals was introduced because the number of teams increased from 9 to 12.

In the quarters, Sri Lanka won by 5 wickets. India beat Pakistan by 39 runs. South Africa lost to West Indies by 19 runs. Australia cruised into the semis by 6 wickets victory over New Zealand.

In the semis, Sri Lanka won against India and Australia won by 5 runs over West Indies.

In the finals, Sri Lanka won by 7 wickets and became World Champions.

#### 7. 1999- Seventh World Cup at England and Wales

In this world cup tournament, Super Six was introduced. Pakistan, Australia, South Africa, New Zealand, Zimbabwe and India were qualified for the Super Six.

In the semi-finals, Pakistan beat New Zealand by 9 wickets and in the other semi-final, it was a tie between Australia and South Africa. Since Australia finished higher than South Africa in the Super Six table, Australia went into the finals.

In the finals Australia won by 8 wickets against Pakistan.

# 8. 2003- Eighth World Cup at South Africa, Kenya and Zimbabwe

Australia, India, Kenya, Sri Lanka, Zimbabwe and New Zealand qualified as the Super Six. In the Semis, Sri Lanka's hopes went down the drain with a defeat to Australia by 48 runs and Kenya lost to India by 91 runs. In the finals, Australia won by 125 runs against India.

#### 9. 2007- Ninth World Cup at West Indies

Super Eight was introduced because there were 12 teams now. Australia, South Africa, New Zealand, England, Ireland, West Indies, Sri Lanka and Bangladesh were qualified for the Super Eights.

In the Semis, Sri Lanka won by 81 runs against New Zealand, and Australia defeated South Africa by 7 wickets.

Australia broke Sri Lankan's hearts in the finals by defeating them by 53 runs in a rain-affected match.

# 10. 2011- Tenth World Cup at India, Bangladesh and Sri Lanka

In Semis, India won by 29 runs and Sri Lanka defeated New Zealand by 5 wickets.

In the finals, the Sri Lankan team lost to India by 6 wickets. India became the champion after 28 years.

# 11. 2015- Eleventh World Cup at New Zealand and Australia

From Pool A, New Zealand, Australia, Sri Lanka and Bangladesh qualified for the quarters. From Pool B, India, South Africa, Pakistan and West Indies qualified for the quarters.

In the quarters, South Africa won by 9 wickets against Sri Lanka; India won against Bangladesh by 109 runs; Australia won against Pakistan by 6 wickets; New Zealand won against West Indies by 143 runs.

In the semis, New Zealand won by 4 wickets in a rain-affected match, and Australia won against India by 95 runs.

Australia won the finals against New Zealand by 7 wickets.

# 12. 2019- Twelfth World Cup at England

Purasala Venkata Sindhu, known as P.V. Sindhu, was born on July 5, 1995 in Hyderabad. She was born to P. Vijaya and P.V. Ramanan who were good volleyball players. The ace shuttle player first came to attention when she broke into the list of top 20 players according to the Badminton World Federation (BWF) in September 2012 at the age of 17. She first started playing badminton at the age of eight. She won her first tournament in the All India Ranking Championship in the under ten category. She won the Sub-junior Nationals in the under 13 category.

#### Sindhu's Achievements

In 2013, she won the first Grand Prix award by defeating the Singaporean player Gu Juan. In the same year, she was awarded the Arjuna Award. She became the first Indian to win two back-to-back medals in the BWF world badminton championship.

Sindhu became more popular in 2016. She was the first female athlete from India to win a silver medal in the Rio Olympics. She won a gold medal in the Commonwealth Games. At the Asian Games 2018 she won a silver medal in the women's singles event. On December 16, 2018 she made a world record by winning the BWF World Tour Finals.

P.V. Sindhu has inspired many youngsters of our generation to take badminton as a career.

Grades 6 to 9 participated in a survey on YouTube channels




YouTube is a fast growing medium of entertainment. I conducted a survey to know how many students from grades 6 to 9 watch YouTube.


Do you like to watch YouTube?
